ZONING VARIANCE DENIED

The request for a zoning variance at Rainier and Cloverdale was heard by the Hearing Examiner January 5. Request was denied.

Your Executive Board, at its meeting January 23, reaffirmed its opposition to any change from Conservancy Management to Urban Stable in the usage of shoreland on Lake Washington from Atlantic City Park to the 9500 block on Rainier Ave. So. Our continued opposition was conveyed to the Hearing Examiner by letter concerning reclassifying approximately 7.4 acres (File XS-78-259) at a hearing January 29. A report will be given by those attending the hearing, but the outlook against the change is not bright.

You've seen the posts agrowing on the ledge below Emerson School and above the Hutchinson Playfield...Well, they didn't just grow there. The first year, a fellow by the name of Joel Harvey was working getting the materials together and many pre-cut for the project. When the posts were being dug, they needed an onsight coordinator and Dwight Perkins offered his time...His wife, Leslie, was the telephone chairman for the project...You know, the person who calls people trying to line up workers...Together they have broughthe project to near completion. Many thanks to S.E.E.D. for the arrangements, Joel Harvey for the beginning, and ESPECIALLY Dwight and Leslie Perkins for their devotion. Thanks, of course, also to all of those who have donated their labor to the project.

CONDOMINIUMS ALONG THE BEACH

This is ongoing warfare that we would lose if not carried on forcibly and diligently. The City and other interests (Milltown Properties of Canada - developers) want to rezone and develop the area along Seward Park Ave. and Rainier Ave. from the T-Villa (which they own) to the City Park property on Rainier. This area is now Conservancy Management zoned which forbids any development except that specifically allowed by the community, and water oriented. A number of years ago, your club fought hard to obtain this zoning when the T-Villa people sneaked in their monstrosity. Last May, we had to fight again and won by disallowing Milltown to rezone this whole area "Urban Stable." Urban Stable would allow for 35-feet high buildings with corridors to the lake, but would have allowed full development of the whole area along the lake. Now Milltown is at it again by asking for rezoning in order to build 10 finger piers out into the lake. Of course the rezoning would allow for much more than finger piers as we see it, so the fight is on again. We almost lost Jack this summer when Mr. Moberly, Seattle Superintendant, decided unilaterally to remove 6 principals. When informed, club members rose to the occasion with letters and calls to the Superintendant. We still have Jack as our principal...

METRO UPDATE

It looks as though our petition drive got some attention! Metro carried out an extensive community phone interview after receiving the club's petition for change of the Turnaround from Rose St. to Henderson (or farther south). From Mr. Neil Peterson's letter to the club, we can only gather that the issue is now a very live one and that the change will be made. This effort has been a long time coming but necessary before trolley lines are fixed.

CHANGE IN LEADERSHIP

Just recently after a minor accident at the clubhouse, our President, Orval Wiltse, began complaining of back problems. It became so dibilitating that he sought help from specialists and a complete examination followed. As a result, Orval has to take it easy for a while and remove nimself from stress until his condition improves. Bob Ridder, Vice President, will fill in for him until installation of new officers at our first meeting of the year. Orval was to be Vice President this coming year, so a new Vice President must be elected from the floor on September 11. Orval has done an outstanding job this year. - -- A reduced Rainier Beach Library;
- -- An undeveloped and vacant garbage dump along Rainier Avenue;
- -- No facility for community gatherings and private parties in this area;
- -- A reduced program at Emerson and change of administration there.

With your community club, we have:

- -- An ongoing liaison with the Parks Department on the rebuilding of Hutchinson Field House;
- -- Ongoing liaison with the Library Board on the building of the Rainier Beach Library;
- -- Active participation in Metro Transit planning;
- -- Constant surveillance of new building and rebuilding permits and variances;
- -- A scholarship program that enables a Rainier Beach student a college opportunity annually;
- -- Development of committee expertise on city government and members who will testify on vital issues;
- -- A club building facility;
- -- Sponsorship of a Scout troup.



METRO TRANSIT

The first year, a fellow by the name of Joel Harvey was working getting the materials together and many pre-cut for the project. When the posts were being dug, they needed an onsight coordinator and Dwight Perkins offered his time...His wife, Leslie, was the telephone chairman for the project...You know, the person who calls people trying to line up workers...Together they have broughthe project to near completion. Many thanks to S.E.E.D. for the arrangements, Joel Harvey for the beginning, and ESPECIALLY Dwight and Leslie Perkins for their devotion. Thanks, of course, also to all of those who have donated their labor to the project.

CONDOMINIUMS ALONG THE BEACH

This is ongoing warfare that we would lose if not carried on forcibly and diligently. The City and other interests (Milltown Properties of Canada - developers) want to rezone and develop the area along Seward Park Ave. and Rainier Ave. from the T-Villa (which they own) to the City Park property on Rainier. This area is now Conservancy Management zoned which forbids any development except that specifically allowed by the community, and water oriented. A number of years ago, your club fought hard to obtain this zoning when the T-Villa people sneaked in their monstrosity. Last May, we had to fight again and won by disallowing Milltown to rezone this whole area "Urban Stable." Urban Stable would allow for 35-feet high buildings with corridors to the lake, but would have allowed full development of the whole area along the lake. Now Milltown is at it again by asking for rezoning in order to build 10 finger piers out into the lake. Of course the rezoning would allow for much more than finger piers as we see it, so the fight is on again. The Department of Community Planning has brought forth a simpler process for variance hearings and will be at the September meeting for a brief outline of their plan - also questions from YOU the community. Here's a chance to give them your two bits.....

SCHOOL CLOSURES

That's an alarming two words but not so alarming if you control the process. There will be a School Facilities Planning Meeting on September 10 at Mercer Jr. High, 1600 Columbian Way, beginning at 7:30 p.m. School closures and attendance areas will be discussed. Emerson has an excellent principal in Jack Rollo and because of his work in public relations in the neighborhood, we have an ethnically balanced school requiring NO bussing of students in or out. We almost lost Jack this summer when Mr. Moberly, Seattle Superintendant, decided unilaterally to remove 6 principals. When informed, club members rose to the occasion with letters and calls to the Superintendant. We still have Jack as our principal...

METRO UPDATE

It looks as though our petition drive got some attention! Metro carried out an extensive community phone interview after receiving the club's petition for change of the Turnaround from Rose St. to Henderson (or farther south). From Mr. Neil Peterson's letter to the club, we can only gather that the issue is now a very live one and that the change will be made. This effort has been a long time coming but necessary before trolley lines are fixed.

CHANGE IN LEADERSHIP

Just recently after a minor accident at the clubhouse, our President, Orval Wiltse, began complaining of back problems. It became so dibilitating that he sought help from specialists and a complete examination followed. As a result, Orval has to take it easy for a while and remove nimself from stress until his condition improves. Bob Ridder, Vice President, will fill in for him until installation of new officers at our first meeting of the year. Orval was to be Vice President this coming year, so a new Vice President must be elected from the floor on September 11. Orval has done an outstanding job this year. Drop by and give him your appreciation in person. MANY THANKS, ORVAL!

LET'S GO IT TOGETHER

Your community is getting better all of the time. Noting the increased building in the area, substantial family homes at that, brings home to us the faith that investors have in your Rainier Beach. The Mayor regularly sends a representative to your community club meetings - a definite recognition by the downtown establishment of your voice and the political impact of your decisions. Metro, the Parks Department, Library Board, Department of Community Development, and the School Board have all solicited the club and have liaison members from the club involved in their decision making processes. When your club speaks, it gets an answer and change is frequently effected. Through regular meetings and interested membership, we have been able through the years to build rapport with our elected officials and city departments. Their listening to us and their indulgence in our views and deliberations gives us great hope for Rainier Beach's future.



LAND USE REPORT: Stu Weiss reveals that Seattle City Hall has new "proposed multi-family land use policies." This calls for rezoning many parcels of land throughout Seattle to allow higher density duplexes, townhouses, and high-rise apartments. Among changes proposed are: 1) On the west side of Seward Pk. Ave., where the present buildings are two-story apartments, the plan would allow 60-ft. high apartments up to 90 ft. wide.; 2) West of Rainier Ave. and south of Henderson St., where the library, Seattle-First bank branch and four-story apartments now stand, the same 60-ft. high buildings would be allowed; and 3) Townhouses, duplexes, triplexes and tandem houses would be allowed on Cloverdate St. about three blocks west of Empire Way on the south side hill that was recently bulldozed clear of trees and which is now single family zoned. We have just a few months in which

to present our views to the City on this plan.

WE PROTEST! In a letter sent to the Seattle City Council, with a copy to the Mayor, a vigorous protest has been made against the recently announced proposal to move the Seward Park Art Class to the Central Area. It was pointed out that a lot of time and effort, and "our tax dollars" to support "this superb project," hence it belongs in our area. It was emphasized that the art project was the result of the dedicated effort and hard work of many persons. A letter also was sent to Supt. David Moberly deploring any plans for the closure of schools in our district even though the proposals were described as being of long-range planning. In connection with that situation, a recent newspaper article revealed that Cleveland High School students voted overwhelmingly to stay in that school rather than move to nearby Asa Mercer School. The article cited various other plans such as the Cleveland School becoming a 7th and 8th grade center, and the possibility of closing Franklin and Cleveland High and transferring staffs and students to the Mercer School.

A CUTOFF PROPOSAL!

At the last meeting of our Executive Board, it was learned there is a move under way to close a section of Seward Park Avenue from roughly Atlantic City Park to Rainier Avenue to both south and north bound traffic as a measure of greater safety for children. While any action on the issue was tabled, it was felt that the community should become aware of the proposal.

TURN ON THE LIGHTS! Turning on of lights that were turned off during the last power shortage is urged by the Lakewood-Seward Park Community Club in a letter to Mayor Charles Royer. Particular attention is directed to arterials, including several in or nearby the Rainier Beach area, as follows: Empire Way So. from the city limits to So. Henderson St.; Empire Way So. and So. Henderson St.; So. Henderson St. from Seward Park Ave. So. to Empire Way So. It points out inadequate lighting is "especially true of the area in front of the Rainier Beach High School."

SHORT SHOTS: Caroline Kuehnert, Chairperson of the Membership Committee, points out that membership dues (\$2 per person) are overdue and urges that they be paid immediately. She warns if dues are not paid, persons will be cut off from the newsletter***The Hutchinson Fieldhouse is open and staffed in the afternoons; Will Campbell is the supervisor and can be reached at 723-7851 or 723-7052 for further information***Better lighting of the kitchen in the clubhouse is planned***Remember, anyone who wants to obtain or get rid of something, or give or receive certain services, can be listed in the newsletter free of charge***
